LHS Receives \$5,000 Grant to Continue Middle School Archeological Digs:

The Lawrence Township Community Foundation (LTCF) announced in May that 8th graders will continue to have the opportunity to do research in the Great Meadow. Digs have been conducted for the past four years (Fall and Spring) according to Board Member Chris Lahoda. To date, over 1,200 students have participated in the archeological digs. This year, several artifacts including arrowheads, a piece of a native American pipe and cracked rock were found on the site. The award from LTCF will insure that these explorations into our past will continue in the future.

LHS Board Sets Pricing Structure for Use of Brearley House

After several months of review and discussion, the LHS Board adopted the dual rental structure for utilization of the Brearley House at their May meeting. The key distinction is between Meetings and Parties: The following criteria for utilization of the Brearley house:

Meetings

Lawrence Township and Township
Appointed Committees: No Charge

Other Historical Societies: No Charge

501(c)3 Non-Profit Organizations:
Up to four (4) Hours: \$50
Up to eight (8) Hours: \$100

Business Organizations:
Up to four (4) Hours: \$150
Up to eight (8) Hours: \$300

Parties

Fewer than 50 People: \$250
50-100 People: \$300
100-150 People: \$500
Over 150 People: \$700

A \$100 non-refundable deposit is required to reserve a date and time.

Balance of payment due no later than 30 days prior to the event.

A damage deposit of \$300 is required and refundable within 14 days upon satisfactory post-event inspections.

In addition, renters must sign a "hold harmless" agreement and apply by strict guidelines set forth in the "Agreement and Guidelines for Use of Facilities".

Guidelines include:

- a mandatory portable toilet for groups of 100 or more;
- all appropriate permits must be secured by the renter;
- all events must conclude by 11 PM.

Tanner to be Published

An article by Mary Tanner on the involvement of Joseph Brearley and the ill-fated attempt to pull present day Canada into the American Revolution will be published in a future edition of *New Jersey Heritage Magazine*. The narrative features excerpts from letters exchanged between family members as Joseph marched with his regiment through New York on his way to Montreal in February of 1776. With the arrival of British reinforcements, under the direction of General Johnny Burgoyne, colonial troops retreated to New Jersey with Brearley arriving just prior to the battles of Princeton and Trenton.

Ice Cream, Cookies and Song Lure Visitors to the Port Mercer Canal House

On Sunday afternoon, June 9th, the LHS opened the Port Mercer Canal House for tours as part of "Canoe the Canal Day".

Vicki Chirco, Historian for the Delaware and Raritan Canal State Park, was on-site as a tour guide as were several LHS volunteers. Return visitors from last year noted the enhanced appearance of the house, thanks to a \$20,000 appropriation from the State of New Jersey.

In addition to the fresh coat of paint, wooden floors and a cracked sewer pipes have been repaired, electrical upgrades have been made and work has been done on the chimney flues. Many of these improvements were made as the house was still suffering from damage inflicted by Hurricane Floyd in 1999.

Next year, visitors will experience additional improvements to the grounds as a site plan has been approved to beautify the landscape and drain storm water away from the structure. Doerler Landscapes will begin the project this fall.

Port Mercer House Open this Summer

On Saturday, August 3rd, the Port Mercer Canal house will open at 9 AM. Historian Vicki Chirco will give guided tours of the Canal House beginning at 9:30. Tours will be followed by a walk to the Great Meadow where docents will be on hand at the Brearley House for the regular tour from 10 AM until 12 noon. 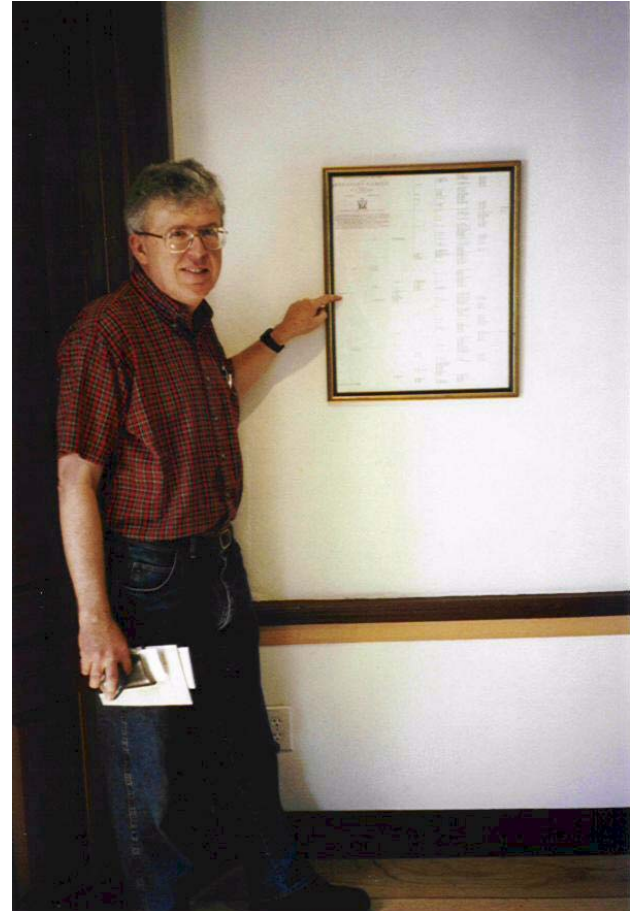
